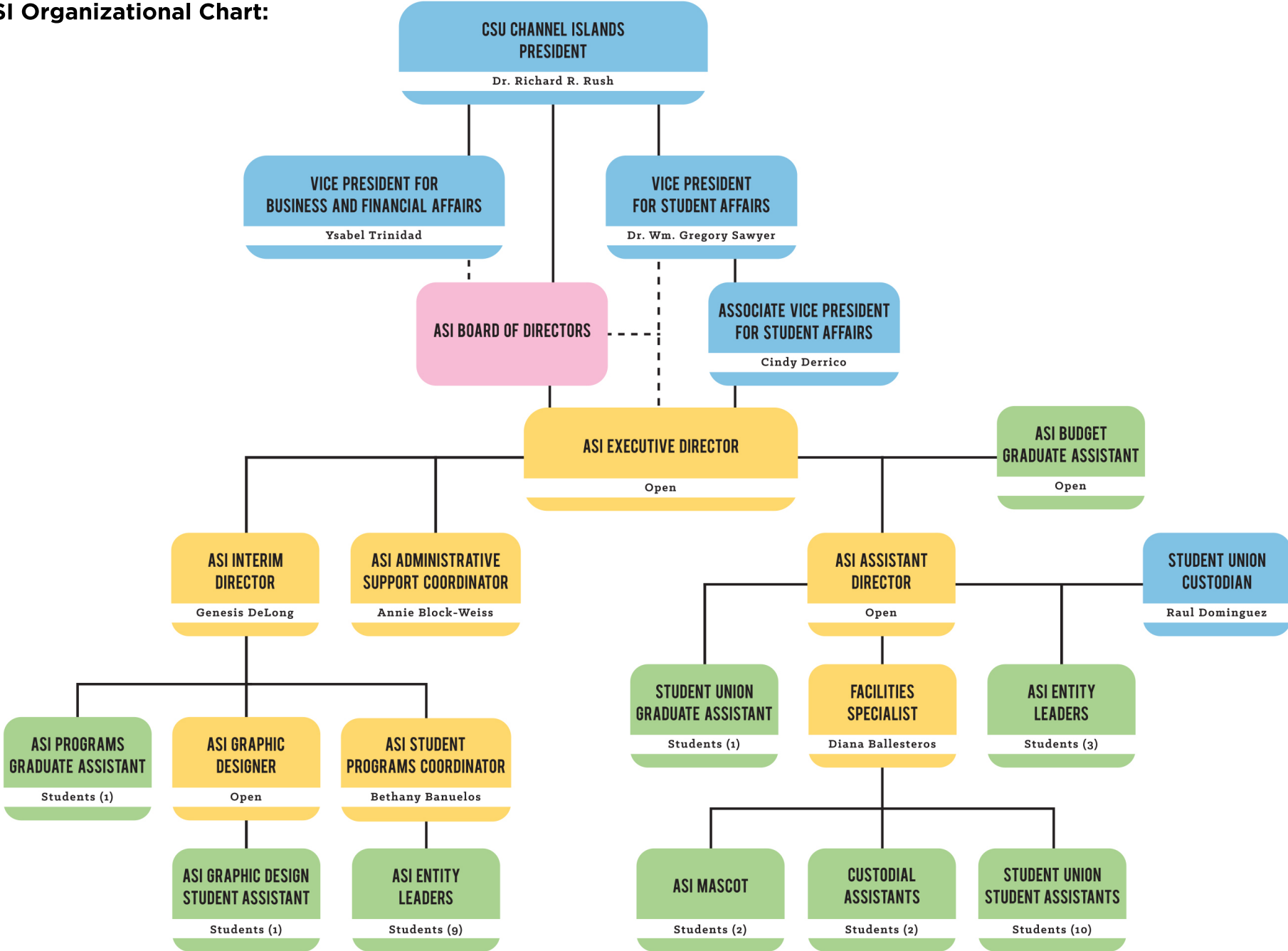

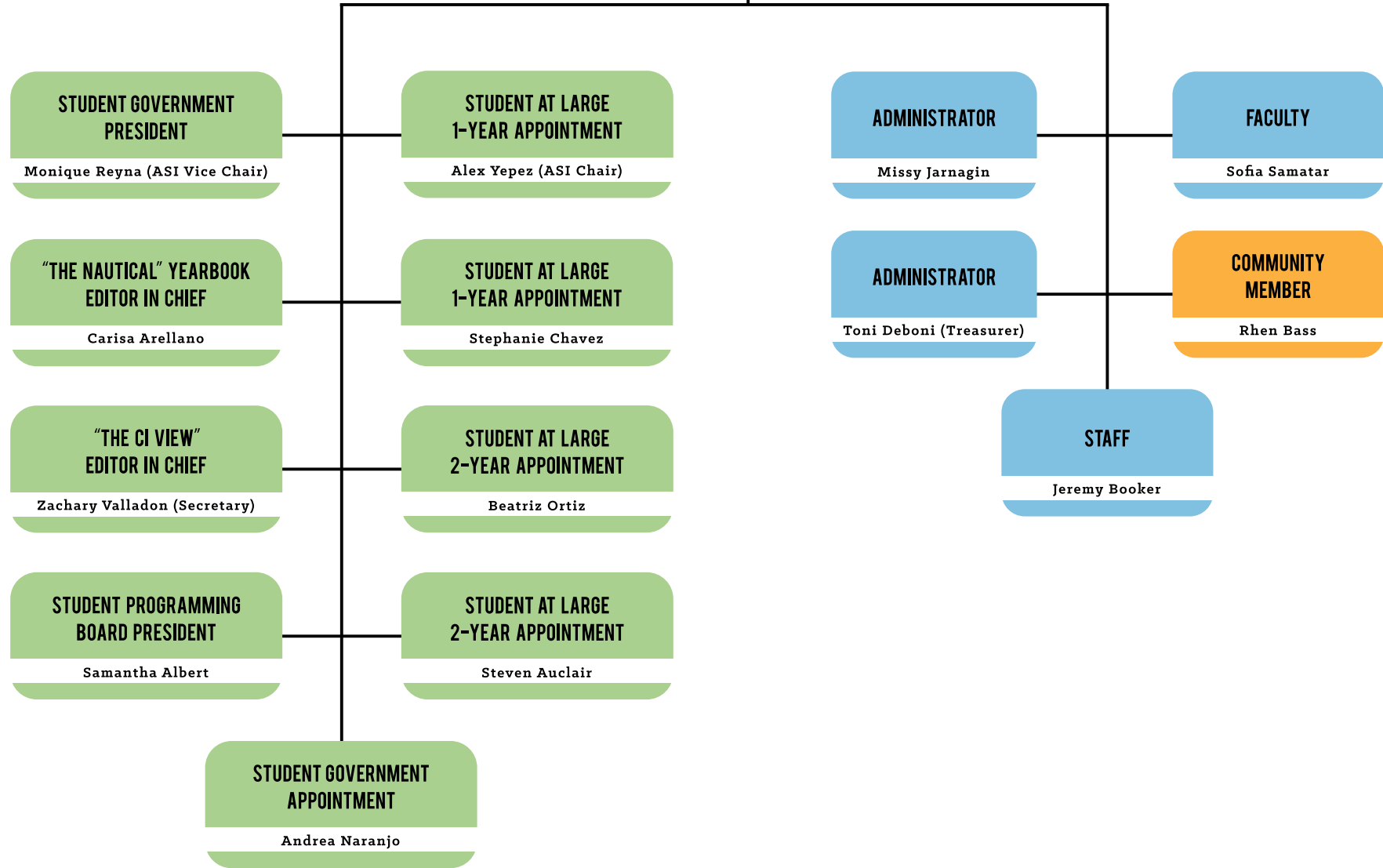

Commencement Vocalist Committee

In conjunction with CI faculty, staff and students, ASI spearheaded the 2016 CI Commencement Vocalist Committee. Auditions occurred and selections were made for the national anthem and the CI Alma Mater.

INSIGHT Conference

ASI professional staff participated on the planning committee for CI's first INSIGHT conference, which included justice-focused workshops and discussions related to local causes, strategies to use in advocating for a cause, and connecting with community leaders and organizations.

The Legacy Awards

The second annual *Legacy Awards: A Celebration of Leadership* took place on Thursday, May 5, 2016. This student-initiated collaboration between the Maximus Awards and the Student Leadership Awards is CI's premiere recognition of students, student organizations, faculty, staff and administrators who live the University mission through a commitment to student-centeredness, service, community and individual development.

A highlight from this year's ceremony included a special award presentation for President Richard R. Rush. In honor of President Rush's final year as CI's inaugural president and the legacy of leadership he contributed to CI, student leaders announced that the Outstanding Senior Student Leader Award would be renamed in his honor as the Dr. Richard R. Rush Outstanding Senior Student Leader Award. President Rush was presented with a plaque with the following inscription: "In Honor of Dr. Richard R. Rush for leaving an indelible legacy of leadership, scholarship, and commitment to service, the Outstanding Senior Student Leader Award is hereby renamed the Dr. Richard R. Rush Outstanding Senior Student

In addition, two of ASI's student leaders, Student Government President Monique Reyna and *The CI View* Editor in Chief Zachary Valladon, were honored with the 2016 Silver Dolphin Award, which is selected by members of the Division of Student Affairs' Executive Council through nominations collected from across the Division.

Noon Forum Series

At each event students had the opportunity to hear from a group of expert and student panelists who shared their personal stories and expertise on topics such as Black Lives Matter, Our Dreamers, Homeless & Foster Students, and The Trans* Experience.

The purpose of the Student Union Noon Forum series was to provide an opportunity for CI students to engage with diverse perspectives and to learn about current critical issues that influence the CI community and the public. These events upheld the founding purpose of college unions by providing CI students with a safe place for the free exchange of ideas and constructive dialogue.

While the Noon Forum series was not the end or solution to these critical issues, it provided an opportunity for students to elevate the social justice dialogue at CI and to work together to create positive change for the future.

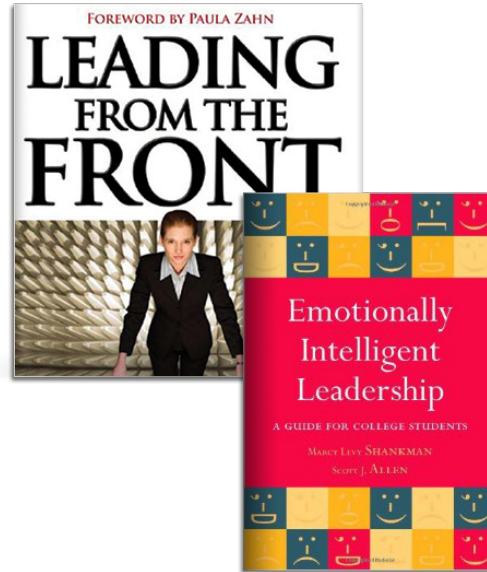

The ASI professional staff created opportunities for student employees to expand their understanding of their leadership capacity, professionalism and student unions.

Book Discussions:

- Each year the Student Union student staff read a contemporary leadership book, conduct a presentation, discuss and reflect on the book, and are asked to apply leadership theory to their daily lives. Professional Development:

Student Training:

- In the fall and spring, ASI and Student Union student employees participated in the Division of Student Affairs (DSA) Student Assistant Orientation and Training. Presentation topics included divisional roles, CI mission, DSA mission, DSA core values, professionalism, etiquette, diversity, and ethical decision making.

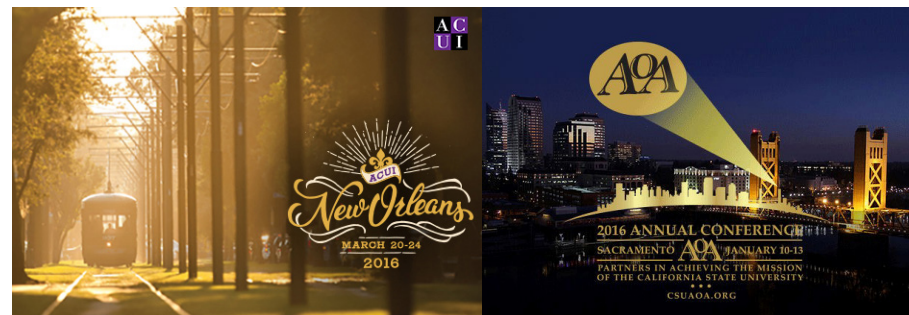



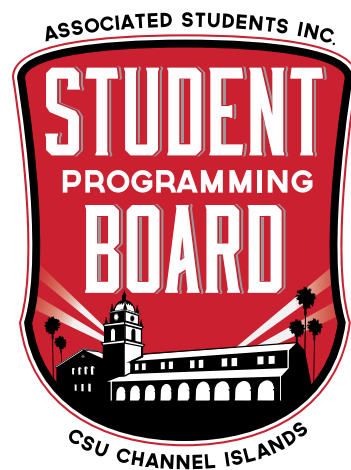

International Fair

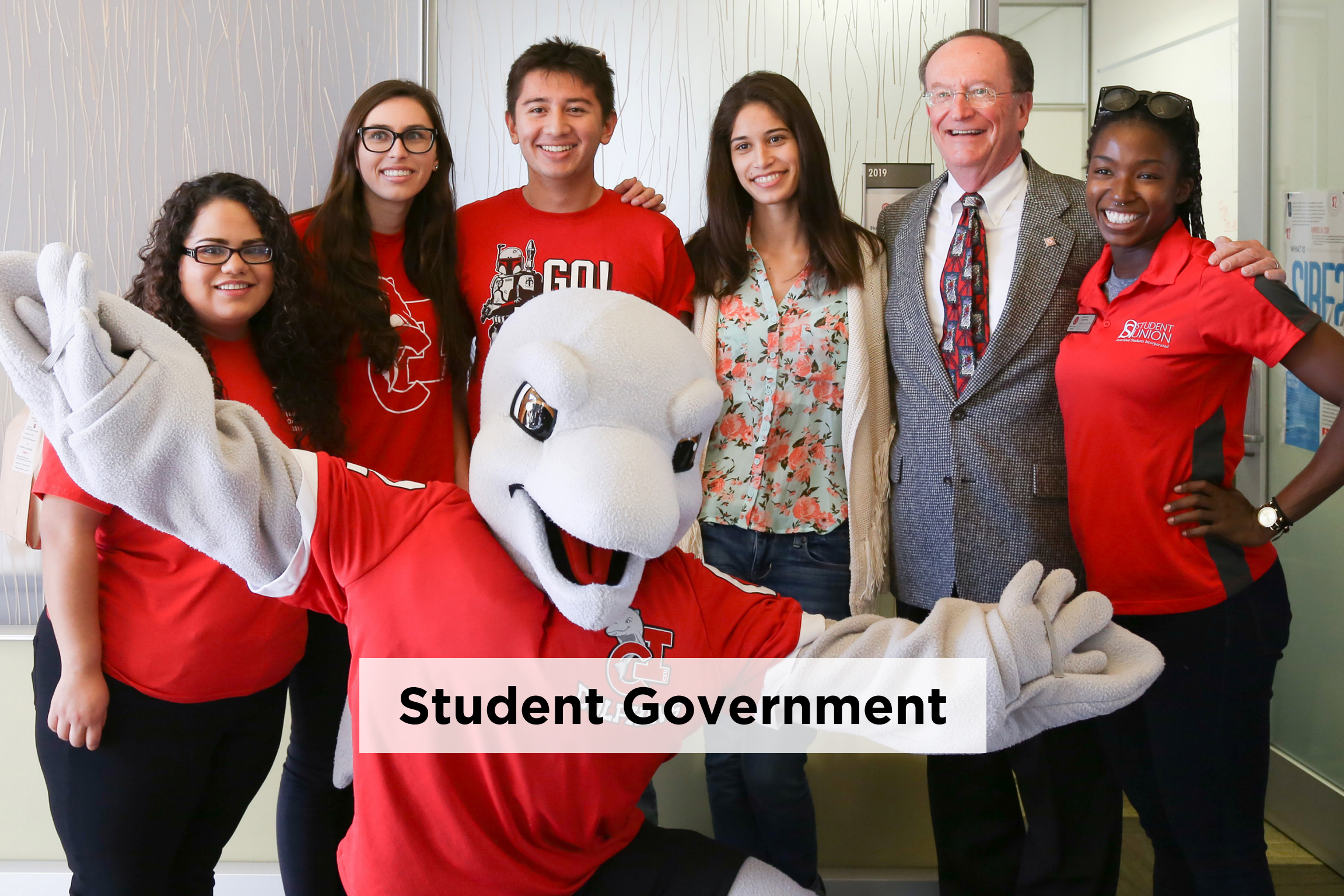
On November 18, 2015 SPB hosted their annual International Fair which highlighted cultures from around the world through educational activities, music, and dance performances provided by CI's students.

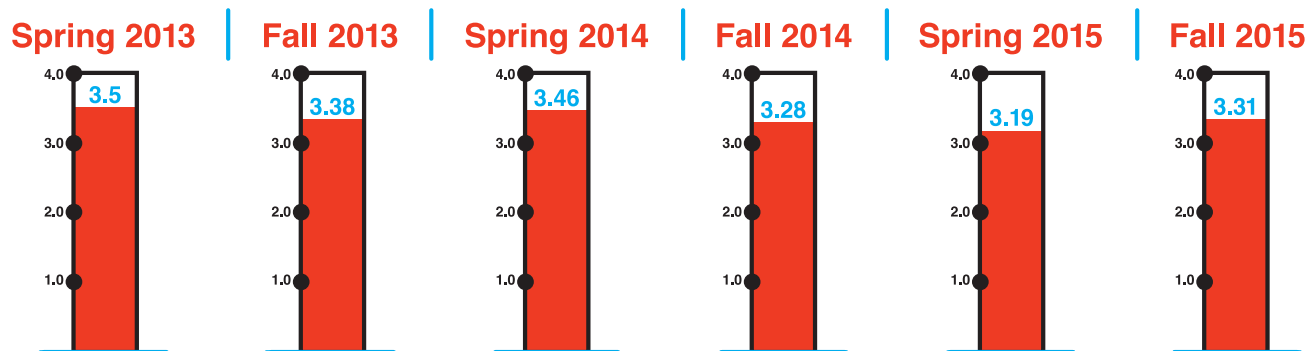

Key Accomplishments

Active Shooter Training

Student Government collaborated with Police & Parking Services and Counseling and Psychological Services to host an active shooter forum at which students could ask service providers questions regarding this timely campus issue.

Food Pantry Initiative

Student Government addressed the issue of food insecurity by creating a proposal for a food pantry on campus. Student Government leaders met with campus partners to develop a sustainability plan for the food pantry's operation, which included pantry location, volunteers, confidentiality, record keeping, supervision, resources, funding and reserves.

State-wide Representation

President Monique Reyna served on the Finance Committee for the California State Student Association (CSSA).

Noon Forum Series

Student Government in collaboration with the Student Union presented the Noon Forum series. 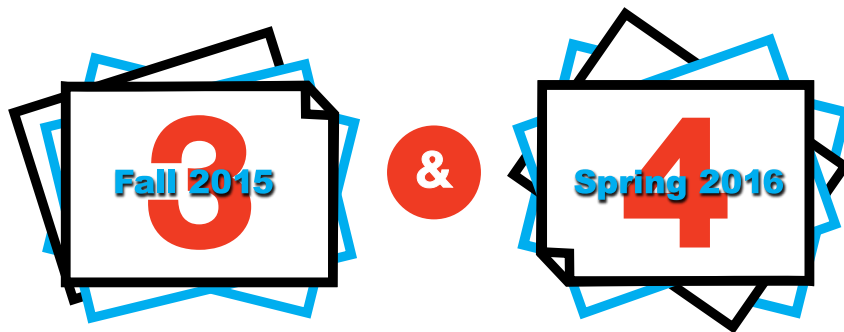
The CI View Newspaper

Key Accomplishments

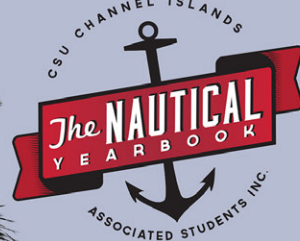

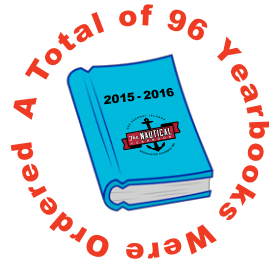
The Nautical Yearbook

Policy and Process Development

ASI participated in the 2016 CSU Chancellor’s Office Student Activities Audit, which reviewed ASI’s processes related to student organization funding and elections. The audit resulted in two minor findings for ASI which included an update to the ASI Election Code and a designation of authority for approval of all disbursements made from student organization funds. In response, the ASI Board reviewed and approved the necessary updates to the ASI Election Code, and the ASI professional staff created a Student Organization Funds Agreement that designates each student organization treasurer as the authority of approval for all student organization fund disbursements.
